comment from *Peter Binsbergen, National Chairman*

2011 has been a challenging and a rewarding year for the Sasol New Signatures team. It was decided to target the less central collection points and the team visited Thaba Nchu, Kimberly and Mthatha.

The visits to these locations proved to be exciting and provided a much needed creative injection which served to inspire the local communities around the country. The information sessions presented around the country during the month of May were well attended and it was decided to include Mthatha as a new collection point using the Nelson Mandela Museum as its home base. The entries from the Eastern Cape were most exciting with a few surprises in Mthatha which echoed the sponsor's sentiments for the necessity of introducing the competition to new and untapped areas.

The 73 finalists for the 2011 Sasol New Signatures are to my mind worthy of their selection. It has been interesting to notice a return to more traditional media and art-making processes with experimentation being the order of the day. There has been considerable attention paid to presentation with the general message hitting home that this competition really focuses on the controversial, contemporary and cutting edge. A good balance remains between all media however, new and traditional. It is encouraging to see artists stepping up to the plate.

It has been interesting to travel around South Africa to see what the New Signatures has on offer. The general trend and subject matter remains open- ended. Artists still seem focussed on personal identity and social issues but it seems that the eye has turned inward even more with the focus on personal struggles and triumphs in whatever form they may take. These ideologies seem to be micro in their approach and character with the iconology being clear and to the point. Artists are choosing to generalize less and focus on specific dated events from a personal viewpoint with a matter of urgency which demands the viewer's immediate attention.

As technology rapidly advances and the cyber village shrinks beyond our wildest imagination, there has been both a celebration and a rejection of the machine. True to the dystopian society we live in, it seems some embrace it, often to the point of abuse, while others may reject this phenomena as the human spiritual evolution battles to keep up with the rapid technological revolution. There seems to be a need for a micro-world, a comfortable personal place and, in most instances, the artist shares with the viewer that which is personal, precious and unique. The true identity of the human spirit emerges with an adamant and demanding voice.



I take this opportunity to thank Sasol for their continuous involvement and investment in the visual arts of our country. Your interest and support plays an integral role in writing the art history of this country and, more importantly, building the future of our young artists.

I express my gratitude to the team that assisted me throughout the countrywide selection process. Nandi Hilliard is in all sense of the word the driving force behind the face of the Sasol New Signatures and without her flawless administrative and public relations skill over the past 21 years, this competition would not be the success and the national bench mark it has become.

The knowledge and insight of Churchill Madikida who accompanied me throughout my travels over the past two years as a representative from Sasol, has been invaluable. As a contemporary South African artist, he has brought much energy to the selection process giving me an opportunity to confer with him on decisions made during the selection process.

"Let's start a fight" is what the title Qhatha may suggest. In Zulu culture two parties ready to fight are kept apart by a mediator clutching soil in each hand. The mediator offers the invitation for conflict with much taunting back and forth between the two parties until one has the courage to slap the soil from the mediator's hand. The first party to do so is seen as the conqueror and the winner even before the physical conflict has begun. In this digital printed diptych, two parties are missing however, and the artist represents all parties concerned.

The work clearly deals with identity and inner conflict which plays out in a set of eclectic and appropriated images. The artist offers himself to the viewer wearing an industrial apron suggesting past racialised labour, a leopard skin vest signifying cultural identity and a bowler hat signifying colonial and western influence in his life. These symbolic images stand in total contradiction to one another yet stand to unite the artist's persona charging the work with a bold and sensual identity drawing the viewer into the space.

Sikhumbuzo Nation Makandula Atop a rock not far from the Mandela royal burial ground along the cultural footprints of Madiba himself in Qunu, stands a young Xhosa man about to perform a trans ritual. Like the shaman himself the artist literally thrashes out his own identity addressing issues of sexuality, tradition, personality, rites of passage and in some instances challenges norms that are so taboo in the conservative cultural environment of the Eastern Cape. The patter of the rain and the beating of the bag on a wet surface encourage the viewer to become part of this rhythmic trans like state which is so prominent in most rituals.

According to the artist, things are either black or white. In order to resolve inner conflict one side must always be denied in favour of the other. A yearning continually exists for self expression which at times may create a sense of alienation from society. This is evident in some of the morph like insect form the artists body transforms into during the ritual which is being performed. Someone will always need to face up and take responsibility for something which is evident when the artist reveals his identity at the end of the ritual when all his energy is spent.
